The Association for Deaf Children is Growing

ADC is proud to have completed its first decade of serving the needs of deaf children and teens in Utah. While our organization initially focused on helping support a proper deaf education in Utah, we have also added additional initiatives including support for the communication, social, and emotional needs of our participants and their families. Over the years we have been able to work closely with the deaf community in order to understand the needs of deaf children and to involve other deaf and hard of hearing individuals to maintain proper and necessary support.

We are proud of what we have accomplished, however, when we look back over the progress we have made in the last decade, we are immediately aware of the many needs which are still not being met. To that end we are growing ADC and reorganizing our functions. We hope that these changes will give us a strong foundation upon which we can continue to build the programs and support our deaf children need and deserve.

The Board of ADC is excited to announce the hiring of Preston Gudmunson as Director for ADC. Preston will take over many of the duties previously fulfilled by Debbie Zeidner, including coordinating ADC's efforts with similar organizations, handling management responsibilities within ADC, and overseeing ADC activities. The Board of ADC also wishes to thank Debbie Zeidner for her many years of leadership in guiding the organization while also managing its day to day activities. Under Debbie's leadership ADC has provided services to at least 60 participants - including families of deaf teens. These services include, among others, tutoring, training in American Sign Language and Deaf culture, and providing social opportunities in a signing environment. We are very proud of her accomplishments and will be watching for her to continue using her abilities to maintain and grow our offerings.

Debbie will continue serving in the ADC organization as its Executive Director; however, Preston will now be the face of ADC for all of our different activities which will include interfacing with ADC participants, their families, and the organizations supported by ADC. Preston will also coordinate all ADC activities including, SYHO (a semimonthly youth activity night), the annual "Signs on the Trail" fundraiser race, and occasional signing workshops for the families of our deaf youth. While Preston assumes the daily operations of ADC, Debbie will focus her full attention on fundraising and public relations. She will work on long term funding solutions for ADC so we can continue offering the same programs we have in the past and allow us to have the necessary resources we need to continue expanding ADC's services. We are genuinely excited about this reorganization and are confident it will allow us to continue growing for the future while securing our services for the present.

ADC also wants to thank the Deaf community for its many years of support and most recently for its involvement in our second annual "Signs on the Trail" 5k fun run fund-raiser. We doubled our participation and our donations over last year and plan to continue growing at the same pace in the future. ADC wants to thank all of the volunteers as well for helping us plan, organize and hold such a large gathering. We plan to hold the event every year in Draper during May. Please stay tuned for announcements of all of our activities so you can mark your calendar and plan to join us.
