Director's Message:

From My Fingers to Your Eyes

SWCDHH Community Members,

Hello!

I would like to introduce myself. My name is David Viers and I have been hired as SWCDHH's new Executive Director. I have been officially on the job since July 9, 2007. I have been getting myself settled in, trying to organize things in a way that makes sense to me. The work here is both interesting and challenging.

Our Case Manager and former Acting Director, Laurie Guggenheim, has been of invaluable assistance in this regard. I want to take this opportunity to commend her for doing an excellent job of holding the place together while still doing her own Case Management duties during the months since the retirement of the last Director (Rusty Wales). Many thanks to her for this past work and for her assistance and tutoring now. While I am on the subject of appreciation, I should also say that, although I have worked most closely with Laurie, we appear to have a very dedicated and knowledgeable staff across the board. I look forward to working with them.

My name and/or face may be somewhat familiar to some of you because I have previously served on SWCDHH's Board of Director's for approximately 2.5 years, the last 1.5 years in the position of Chairperson – so you may have heard about me or seen me at some of SWCDHH's past functions. I actually resigned from the Board so that I could apply for this position.

To give you a thumbnail sketch of my background, I lost a great deal of my hearing through work-related noise exposure – to the point that I closed down the company I had started and run for six years (a data processing service bureau). It was in the course of taking an ASL class at PCC that I was introduced to both the Deaf Community and Self Help for Hard of Hearing People (SHHH). I ultimately became the founding President of the Portland SHHH chapter back in 1985. Since then, I have served on numerous Boards and committees associated with both Deaf and Hard of Hearing people. One of my more interesting experiences was to get a RCD (Rehabilitation Counseling: Deafness) Master's degree from Western Oregon University.

On a personal note, I am married and have two children still living at home: daughters, ages 11 and 13. In addition, I have a son (age 40) and a step-daughter (age 24). I like to think that my kids keep me young-at-heart.

I look forward to seeing you here at the Center and/or our various functions.

Memorial Pilots Remote Interpreting System

It has only been around for a few weeks, but the staff at Memorial's Urgent Care Center (at 3400 Main Street in Vancouver) already has a pet name for the new Language Line Video Interpreting Service.. They're calling it "Rover" because of the machine's ability to move around from room to room. Language



Line is a pilot program designed to save money and improve the patient for those who use American Sign Language (ASL). This is very similar to a Video Relay Service, but the video screen and related equipment is portable and can be moved from room to room and from place to place within a room.

Under normal circumstances, patients needing ASL interpreter services often have to wait before a qualified ASL medical interpreter could be located and brought into the clinic. Now, patients can get access to video-related ASL interpretation within a few minutes, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. An interpreter appears on the monitor screen directly in front of the patient. Because Rover is mobile, registration and other information can be handled in the privacy of the patient's room. Southwest Washington Medical Center (the "parent" company of Memorial Urgent Care Center) hopes the pay-per-use service will reduce its overall on-site interpreting costs, while improving the patient care experience.

Editor's Note: David Viers and Frank Mounts of SWCDHH were invited to Memorial to view this system in operation. Role-playing was done with David as the doctor and Frank as the patient. Frank's medical procedure was a "success". Both David and Frank were impressed by the entire operation.


We are very happy that Gail from the SW Washington Medical Center will provide a workshop on the topic of "Weight Loss."



FREE FIRE SMOKE DETECTOR WITH STROBE LIGHT-ING IS NOW AVAILABLE FOR LOW-INCOME CITIZENS

SWCDHH recently received a grant from the City of Vancouver's Public Safety & Education council. The council has awarded SWCDHH \$2,000 for a number of fire smoke detectors with strobe lighting.

SWCDHH plans to give these smoke detectors to people who meet the qualification guidelines. The requirements are as follows:



As long as you live within the Clark County AND are under \$12,500 income per year, you are qualified to receive up to TWO free alarms per household. (If you already have one alarm, we will provide a second).



Please come to our office with a copy (required) of your verification of income (e.g. a social security letter or a W-2 form).

If you already have fire alarms, please bring in your old alarms. If they are not functioning well, we will gladly replace them.

Are you spending more than you need to for phone service? Save Costs!



No chance to go fishing this summer? Try this recipe for *Phony (Fake) Abalone*

Submitted by Donovan and Dona Mae DeYarmon (Makes 2 servings, or enough for 1 hungry person)



- 2 Boneless, skinless, chicken breast halves
- 1 7- or 10- ounce can of bottled clam juice or nectar
- 2 garlic cloves, split lengthwise, optional
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1 cup seasoned fine bread crumbs, crushed cracker crumbs or all purpose flour
- ½ cup margarine, butter, or vegetable oil
- *Lemon wedges, tartar sauce*

Place chicken breast halves between layers of wax paper or plastic wrap. With meat mallet, pound chicken breast halves until about ¼-inch thick.

Place in small bowl, pour clam juice over top, add garlic cloves, if desired. Marinate chicken in refrigerator for 8 to 24 hours.

Next day, drain off clam juice.

Dip chicken breasts in beaten egg, then in bread crumbs or cracker crumbs. If using flour, dip first in flour, then egg, then flour again.

In skillet over medium-high heat, heat margarine until medium-hot. Sauté chicken until lightly brown and no longer pink in middle.

Serve with lemon wedges and tartar sauce as you would abalone. Enjoy!








